The pristine coastal city of Busselton stands proudly on the shores of Geographe Bay. The protected north-facing coastline and the warming Leeuwin ocean current invites swimmers and the occasional pod of dolphins to frolic in its crystal-clear waters.

Busselton is a city made of, and for, stories – and there are plenty to discover while you're here. One of the first things you'll notice about Busselton is its iconic Jetty. Extending 1.8 kilometres out to sea, the Jetty is a remnant of the thriving timber industry of years gone by.

This is the land of the Wadandi (Saltwater) People, who have cared for this place for the last 60,000 years. We acknowledge that we are all guests here, and that we are invited to tread lightly on Boodja (Country).

WELCOME TO BUSSELTON



KAYA, HELLO!

This guide is here to help you explore Busselton by foot, where you'll encounter friendly locals, streets lined with boutiques and eateries, and a thriving events calendar.



BUSSELTON FORESHORE



Join a long line of holidaymakers who've been creating memories here for generations.
Catch the bright red train to the end of the Busselton Jetty (F17), where you'll find one of just six natural aquariums in the world. At the Interpretive Centre, look out for the building's distinctive triangular roof shape, which has inspired the architecture of neighbouring venues at the Foreshore.
There are a number of excellent drinking and dining options with ocean views, including **The Equinox** (H14), with its large-scale mural depicting the 150-year history of the Jetty. The shaded grassy areas along the Foreshore set the scene for some precious downtime for parents as kids let loose on the adventure playground and youth precinct facilities.

BUSSELTON CULTURAL PRECINCT



Follow the footpaths inland from the Foreshore, and you'll quickly arrive at a collection of beautifully-restored buildings which form the **Busselton Cultural Precinct** (H12). Wander through the heritage-listed Courthouse complex, which includes the cold, dark cells of the **Old Busselton Goal**. Have a bite to eat at the **Lockup Coffee House** and browse the gift shop in the **Old Courtroom**.
The Settlement Art Project features a series of life-size bronze statues depicting the historical characters of Busselton. Take a moment to notice the pregnant **Whaler's Wife** (pictured) and imagine how, left in a new and harsh environment, she would have watched as her husband sailed away, not knowing when he would return.
Heritage Tours of the Busselton Cultural Precinct are available by prior arrangement – contact the Busselton Cultural Precinct to make a booking.

QUEEN STREET

Continue along the town centre's Queen Street, where you'll be shopping and dining alongside the locals. When it comes to eateries, head to **Alberta's** (G10), a venture by ex-employees from **Copenhagen's Noma** restaurant, discover authentic French crepes at **Bistro Breton** (G10), and grab a drink and a bite at **The Fire Station**, reincarnated as a small bar (G8).

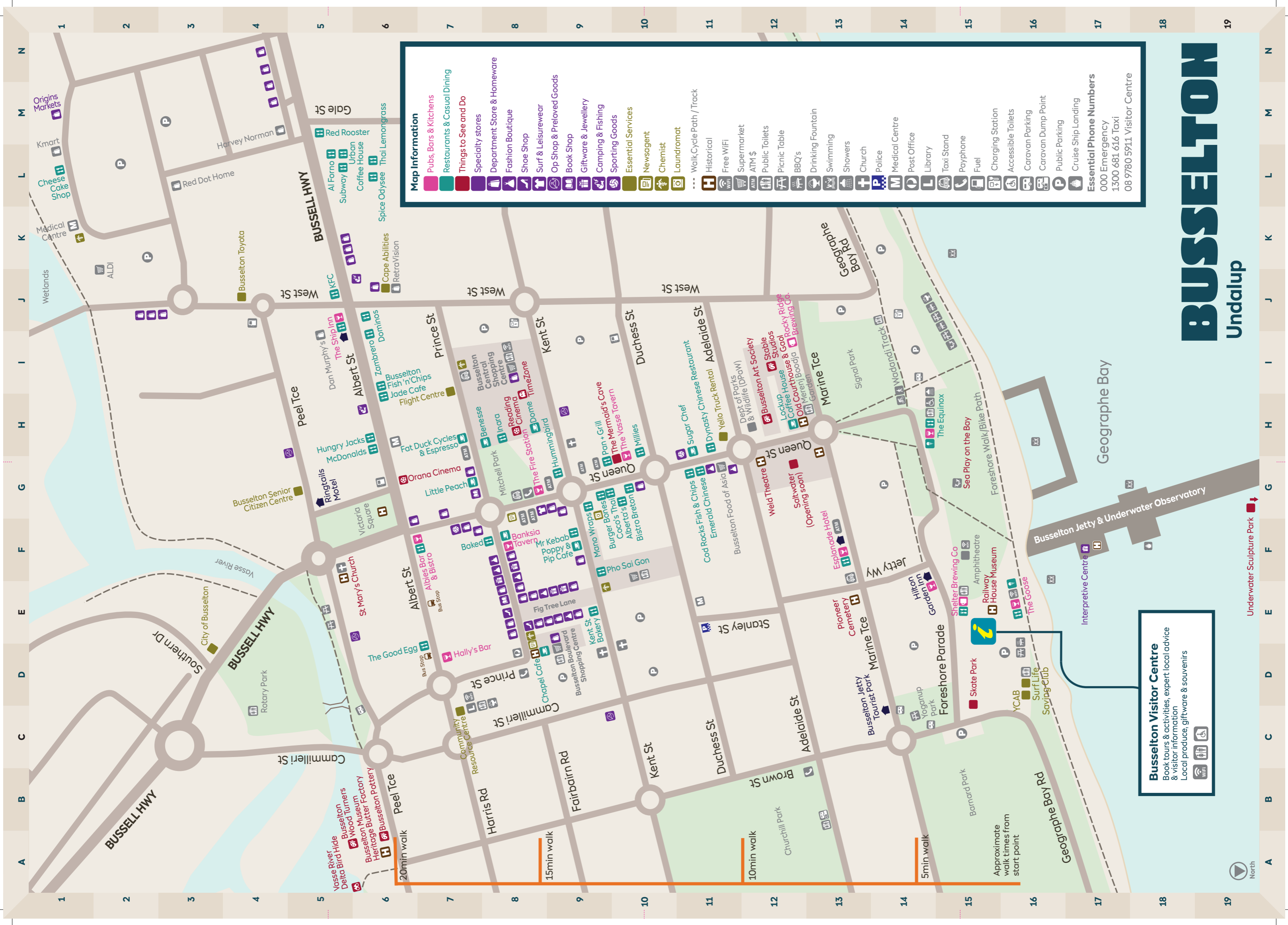
For shopping, browse the boutiques of **Prince Street** and the beautiful **Fig Tree Lane** (E8) for a unique find – whether it's a piece of art for your walls, a gift for a friend, or a new piece for your wardrobe.
Back on the main street, head to the locally-owned surf shops to perfect your 'down south' style, and stop at the gleaming new **Busselton Central** (I8) shopping centre for national fashion stores, groceries and dining.



TERMINAGE



At the end of Queen Street, turn left to find the **Busselton Museum** (A6), which is home to a fully-restored group settlement house, a 1920s school, and other historical memorabilia in the heritage-listed **Old Butter Factory** building. The Museum is part of the Busselton Heritage Trail, which you can follow with a dedicated guide available to purchase at the Museum or Busselton Visitor Centre.
Complete your exploration of the town centre at the award-winning **Origins Market** (M1). This indoor market is an inspirational space to visit and meet the locals, from the artisan, the potter and the candlemaker, to the baker and the vintner. With international cuisine stalls, an event program, licensed tavern, play area and even a resident beehive, don't underestimate the time you'll spend here.
